

## WELCOME!

THE NAME LAPWAI COMES FROM THE NEZ PERCE WORD "THLAP-THLAP" AND REFERS TO THE SOUND MADE BY THE WINGS OF A BUTTERFLY. AS A RESULT OF THE ABUNDANCE OF BUTTERFLIES IN TIMES PAST, THE AREA HAS BEEN REFERRED TO AS THE "PLACE OF THE BUTTERFLY." A SMALL RURAL TOWN WITH A UNIQUE HISTORY, LAPWAI IS FULL OF CULTURE AND CHARACTER. THE COMMUNITY IS SURROUNDED BY MEADOWS, ROLLING FARM LANDS, VINEYARDS, RUGGED BACK COUNTRY, NUMEROUS RIVERS, AND LAKES. COME VISIT US AND EXPERIENCE THE GREAT OUTDOOR ADVENTURES LAPWAI HAS TO OFFER.



## HISTORIC LAPWAI

The Lapwai Valley is historically connected to the Nimipuu People, who have lived in and utilized the area for as long as can be remembered. That rich history continued in 1805, when Captains Meriwether Lewis and William Clark passed through the area enroute to the Pacific with the Corps of Discovery. In 1836, Presbyterian minister Henry Spalding founded the Nez Perce Indian Mission in the Lapwai Valley. At this settlement, Reverend Spalding founded Idaho's first school, built an irrigation system, and grew the state's first potatoes.

LAPWAI HAS BEEN WITHIN THE NEZ PERCE INDIAN RESERVATION SINCE THE NEZ PERCE TREATY OF 1855. THE AREA ALSO BECAME PART OF THE OREGON TERRITORY IN 1848, AND LATER IDAHO TERRITORY. IN 1863, WHEN THE U.S. ARMY WAS ORDERED TO THE LAPWAI VALLEY, FORT LAPWAI WAS ESTABLISHED IN RESPONSE TO LAND DISPUTES DURING THE LOCAL GOLD RUSH. ON JANUARY 11, 1911, THE NEZ PERCE COUNTY COMMISSION RATIFIED A PETITION FOR THE INCORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF LAPWAI. THERE WERE OVER 200 RESIDENTS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE PROPOSED VILLAGE AT THAT TIME.

## LAPWAI TODAY

APWAI IS PRIVILEGED TO SERVE AS THE SEAT OF GOVERNMENT FOR THE NEZ PERCE TRIBE. THE BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS, NORTHERN IDAHO INDIAN AGENCY IS ALSO LOCATED IN LAPWAI. THE TOWN'S POPULATION OF APPROXIMATELY 1100 PEOPLE IS PREDOMINATELY NATIVE AMERICAN, WITH 23 TRIBES REPRESENTED.
